Prescription and over-the-counter (OTC) medications have become the drug of choice for youth. One in five teens have used prescription medications to get high. Most say they obtain the drugs from friends, family or the family medicine cabinet.

What to do with unused medications?

LOCK UP or DROP OFF

The West Allis Police Station now has a 24 hour prescription medication drop-off box in the lobby.

The West Milwaukee Police Station has a medication drop-off available from 7am to 7pm, Monday- Friday for West Milwaukee residents.



Please properly dispose of unused, unwanted, or expired medications. Do not flush them down the toilet, since they could end up in our waterways.

Lock the medicines you use in a secure place. Lockboxes are available for purchase in most drug stores.
